DOUBT- A PARABLE

2005 Pulitzer Prizewinning **Doubt** (it also won the Tony Award as Best Play in the same year) is a riveting exploration of paranoia and suspicion in the Catholic Church.

"What do you do when you're not sure?" Father Flynn asks the audience in the opening line of this play, setting the stage for a story of suspicion and moral certainty.

Set in a Bronx parochial school in 1964 iust as the Vatican II reforms begin to transfigure the Church evidence of a priest's wrongdoing comes to light. Sister Aloysius, a strict school Principal

and traditionalist nun. faces the decision of a lifetime: Does she openly accuse a priest and give voice to her fear of his sinful actions or does she bury her suspicions and leave room for doubt?

This intense and personal power struggle between Sister Aloysius and Father Flynn ultimately calls into question both faith and

justice in the shadows of this cloistered institution.

Doubt is directed by Jan Paterson and stars David Nicholl, Catherine Taylor, Rebecca Noble and Sharyn Twigg.

Discover Your Library—a new segment

On a random basis, Burning News will give you an overview of some of the books/scripts etc in the ILT library which our Librarian Patti Pratt has selected as being interesting and worthwhile.

The comments for each play are there to guide your selection but are not definitive.

If you read about one that you would like to know more about, give Patti a call 3281 2427 1.

Waking Eve by Robert Hewitt is an Australian comedy for 3 males and 3 females. It is a very different, bright and witty modern comedy, with coarse language. Evelyn, main character, is a gem of a role, with some great monologues. All roles are well defined characters. Our audiences would love it. 2.

Why Me? by Stanley Price is from the UK and is a comedy for 3 males and 2 females. It is intellectual, witty, very clever with interesting characters. Negatives are that it has a tame ending and some coarse language. 3.

Woman in Mind is a black comedy from English playwright Alan Ayckbourn. It has a cast of 5 males and 3 females. The plot is as follows: Black comedy dealing with the gradual mental collapse of Susan, which appears to be precipitated by being knocked unconscious by a garden rake. Weary of her boring husband, a priggish, absent son who's ashamed of her. Susan conjures up an ideal family who come to her in her idyllic (imagined) garden as seen through her eyes. Gradually Susan loses control over her idealized people and their visitations, until finally she breaks down completely in a nightmarish and climactic fantasy involving her real and imaginary families. A fascinating insight into a woman's

'crumbling' mind. Lots of challenges for a Director with an imaginative flair for staging. Should be done by ILT. 4.

Sex, Drugs and Rick and Noel by English playwright David Tristram for 2 males and 3 females. It can be performed as a comedy, or as a full-blown musical. It is the story of Richard Branson (not Sir Richard) redundant factory worker, whose wife has just left him for another woman. In a desperate attempt to regain his self esteem, Richard applies to a history course at Birmingham University. There he meets Noel, another fortysomething, with a whole different outlook on life. Together, they learn more than either could have imagined possible - about life, about women, about themselves! Moves between monologues and the story being played out. Fast paced, funny and enjoyable. Needs competent, strong actors to hold audience as it is very wordy.

TIME TO CULL

Our theatre and properties manager, Alan Brown, is most concerned about items of furniture and props, stored in our Jean Pratt building and our shed, that are in such poor condition that they could pose a danger to users. Storage space is at a premium in these areas, and he feels that it is time for a fairly major cull. This will be followed by photographing and cataloguing of our most valuable items so that directors are able to locate and access items more freely. Melinda Park has offered her services for this task.

Alan has enlisted the help of Colin and Jan Paterson to assist with the initial culling. If you have a vested interest in items which are currently stored, and which you think are particularly valuable, you should contact Alan and ask him to inform you of the date and time of the "working bee", so that you can make your contribution and safe guard those items which may only be precious to you.

Currently Alan is proposing to set aside items which he feels are unsafe and have limited value and members will be invited to inspect these items before they are removed from the premises, so I strongly urge you to contact him to indicate your interest.
