Duet for Two Hands - A Tale of Turmoil

A message from the Director - Les Chappell

This play is my all time favourite. I performed the role of Stephen Cass in the early sixties and later used his farewell speech to Abigail as one of my audition pieces for drama school in the UK.

As a young poet, Stephen Cass thinks he is headed for a vacation of peace and relaxation when he visits Forsinard, the home of his friend and surgeon, Dr Edward Sarclet. Instead he is caught up in a bumpy ride of disturbing revelations that affect his mind throughout the entire play.

The intensities that plague this script become apparent on Cass's first entrance. Two years ago he had a dead man's hands grafted onto his wrists because of a climbing accident – and now something strange is hap-

pening.

"It's hard to explain," Cass tells Sarclet. "Somehow the dead man is making himself known to me. I recognise places I've never been to before...things are familiar to the touch. In these last few weeks I've found myself on the look-out for him, almost as though I expected him to pull at my sleeve."

What has really brought Cass to Forsinard? The irresistible law of attraction in the shape of Abigail, Sarclet's attractive daughter? Or something more sinister?

When Cass begins to play the dead man's music he realises it is something more sinister. And when he hears the name of the dead man

shrieked out from a flock of squawking seagulls he becomes totally panicked. So does Herda, Sarclet's sister, who is with him at the time.

Sarclet is opposed to these ever-growing fancies of Cass, as he calls them. Opposed because he too is fighting his own demons and hiding his own dark secrets. But then, demons and dark secrets seem to be buried in everyone's psyche. They are all trying to hide something.

I guarantee that the final three minutes of this play will impress a picture on the minds of audiences that will stay with them long after they have left the theatre.

Duet for Two

Hands is a play not to be missed. But you will have to hurry. The public nights are already more than 70% sold out.
